I get to tell the story of Holy Week every year to the Confirmation students. I watch the confusion and wonder in their faces when I remind them that Jesus gave communion to Judas, who would leave the Last Supper to betray him. I watch as their eyes get wide when I talk about the crown of thorns. I watch them cringe when I talk about the nails in Jesus' hands and feet.

During Holy Week we see the ugliness of sin, we see the pride of human hearts, and we see the humility, service, and love of Jesus. We see a God who used the cross, a tool of death and humiliation, to conquer death and the grave. We see a God who used the sinfulness of humanity to conquer sin, and to save all of us, as undeserving as we are, through grace.

Join us this Holy Week as we journey down the Jerusalem Road.

Join us on Sunday, April 13th at 10am as we enter the gates of Jerusalem with Jesus, waving our palm branches in celebration.

Join us Thursday, April 17th at 7pm as we share in the Last Supper with Jesus and his disciples, then take that same road out of Jerusalem to the Garden of Gethsemane where Jesus was betrayed and arrested.

Join us on Friday, April 18th at 7pm as we walk the road back into Jerusalem for Jesus' trial, and follow him as he carries his own cross to that infamous hill where he was crucified.

And finally, join us on Sunday, April 20th at 8am or 10am as we walk that road to the empty tomb, where Jesus rose from the grave, conquering sin and death, and offering all of us grace.





Guard yourself carefully against those false, deluding ideas which tell you,

"Wait a little while, I will pray in an hour; first I must attend to this or that." Such thoughts get you away from prayer into other affairs, which so hold your attention and involve you that nothing comes of prayer that day.

- Martin Luther, 40 Day Lent Devotional

I have that quote from Luther's Devotional book on a post-it note on my desk, reminding me to pray. Being a pastor can be a busy gig, and it's easy to get caught up in the daily to-do's and to let prayer slip out of my schedule. In the same way, life in general gets busy for all of us: schedules get packed, and energy levels drain. Often prayer is put on the back burner, or not even on the stove top to begin with.

Prayer is powerful. And while some find it a daunting endeavor, prayer is simply a conversation with God. Prayer can be talking to God about your day, venting your frustrations, sharing your excitements, wondering about things you don't understand, and (of course) asking God for things. When we pray, God listens. When we pray, God acts.

I want to encourage you, right now (yes, right now), to say a prayer. Set a timer for just 1 minute, and pray to God. Talk to God about whatever you want to talk about for that 1 minute, and then thank God for listening and say Amen.

God is with you. God is listening. God cares. God is working. **Amen.**



Ben Nikodym has Accepted His First Call!

Ben recently reached out to let us know that he has accepted his first call. He will be a fulltime Deacon at St. Luke Evangelical Lutheran Church in Campbell Hill, Illinois. His role will be that of a deacon but will "basically be the pastor for this church."

A Word from your Pastor

For the next few months, I'll be breaking down the 4 criteria that it takes to be a Reconciling in Christ Church. What does this mean? What does this not mean? The first of the four things on the Reconciling in Christ website is a Welcome Statement.

The website says:

#1 - Clearly state a welcome to people of "all sexual orientations, gender identities, and gender expressions" or "LGBTQIA+" and name its commitment to "racial equity" or "anti-racism" in a Welcome Statement.

I've heard a couple of really great questions about the welcome statement, and I want to offer an answer to these questions.

Why do we need a welcome statement? Isn't "All Are Welcome" enough?

"All Are Welcome" is an excellent welcome statement that is encompassing for everyone. This is also a statement that every church makes across our country. But not every church is an open and affirming church. Some say, "All are welcome," but have strings attached for folks in the queer community (e.g. you must be celibate for the rest of your life, you must "convert" to being straight, etc.). As queer folks experience this in churches, they are often wary of worshiping at any church unless they are clear that LGBTQIA+ folks are welcome at that church without strings attached.

Isn't a welcome statement that specifically welcomes some going to make others feel unwelcome?

Our Welcome Statement doesn't need to *only* include the LGBTQIA+ community. The hope is that when we make a welcome statement, we can craft it in such a way that welcomes everyone *including* those who are in the queer community.

Many churches have done this around the nation, and I want to highlight our neighbor, Lutsen Lutheran's welcome statement.

Lutsen Lutheran says, "We are a Reconciling in Christ Congregation. You are invited to participate in the life of the church regardless of your sexual orientation, gender expression, political leanings, religious affiliation, immigration status, or attitude toward lutefisk."

They are intentional about welcoming everyone, regardless of our differences.

Does our welcome statement mean we have to hang a rainbow flag or banner?

No. We do not have to hang a flag or a banner.

The Welcome Statement can be on our website, on posters in our church, in our bulletin or newsletter - it can be anywhere that we want to publish it. But it does not mean that we are required to start flying a rainbow flag.

A final thought:

As we continue to discern where God is calling our church and the act of publicly welcoming all to our church, it is important for me that we keep the cross at the center. The altar and cross are at the focal point of our Sanctuary for a reason. That reason being: It's all about Jesus. Jesus' radical love for *everyone* should be the focus of what we do and say; the focus of our welcome statement that invites others to experience that love; and the focus of our worship of our Triune God.

I'm open and available for anyone that wants to talk more about this process. We will be taking our time, making space for open and honest dialogue, offering educational opportunities, and being intentional about praying throughout this process.

The April Mission of the Month is going international - yet has a very local connection. We will be supporting the **Ray of Life** project which supplies solar light kits to families in Ukraine who are living without electricity.

This mission was started by Dave Nonnemacher of Two Harbors, (formerly of Grand Marais). His non -profit, New Horizons Foundation,

will use the funds we raise to purchase components needed for the solar kits. Volunteers will then assemble the kits and prepare them for shipping.



Assembly events have been held in North Shore locations including Beaver Bay and at Lutsen Lutheran. We are excited to have Dave come to Bethlehem on May 20th to lead an assembly event. The parts for each kit currently cost \$125. We

hope our members will respond generously. Wouldn't it be great to give this gift to at least twenty families?

Murray's Grand Adventure

Tom and I plan to make a Camino de Santiago pilgrimage through Portugal and Spain in May. The journey we're taking covers roughly the first half of the 185 mile walk Tom and our daughter Lauren made last spring. Instead of finishing in Santiago de Compostela, the traditional ending for pilgrims, we plan to walk as far as the historic Galician port town of Baiona.



We look forward to conversations with pilgrims from all over the world, enjoying Galician culture, eating pastries for breakfast and fish for supper, and soaking in the rugged Atlantic coastline. We'll take it a day at a time, just putting one foot in front of the other and holding hands when the journey requires it or just for the heck of it.

Our eleven-day walk will include overnights in albergues (hostels) . . . some in cramped bunkrooms with other snoring pilgrims, but also some nights in private rooms. There will be days of relentless hills, but also days along beaches, walking ancient Roman cobblestone paths, along urban city sidewalks, and through a succession of eucalyptus woods and vineyards. I'm looking forward to photographing smelling flowers, seeing wildlife, and just spending time with Tom. We'll have a couple of free days at the end of our journey which we'll mostly spend back in the beautiful city of Porto where our journey began.

History of the pilgrimage:

The Camino de Santiago de

Compostela (Way of St. James the Great) is a network of pilgrimages leading to the shrine of the Apostle James in the Cathedral of Santiago de Compostela in Galicia in northwestern Spain. Legend holds that St. James' remains were carried by boat from Jerusalem to northern Spain where he was buried in the city of Santiago de Compostela. The Way of St. James became a major pilgrimage route of medieval Christianity at the beginning of the 9th century. Thousands of pilgrims from around the world still follow its many routes as a form of spiritual path or retreat for their spiritual growth.

Do you every wonder where our palms come from? Since 2015 Bethlehem has ordered Fair Trade Eco-Palms for Palm Sunday, in partnership with Lutheran World Relief. We are helping palm harvesters in Latin America, their families and communities find pathways out of poverty.

Ecologically Friendly

An effort to certify palm fronds from communities practicing sustainable forestry is currently underway. These communities have taken it upon themselves to utilize harvesting practices that minimize the impact on the natural ecosystem.

Economic Opportunities

Fair prices for quality palms encourage sustainable harvesting, meaning better income long into the future. More than a half of the farmers in Guatemala's Central Peten earn income by harvesting palm fronds and more than a support themselves exclusively collecting palm fronds. Eco-Palms are sorted and within the harvesting community, Extending income opportunities to even more people

Sustainable Income


Responsible palm frond gathering actually protects valuable natural forests. Eco-Palms harvesters often earn five to six times more per frond than traditional palms, and a portion of the purchase price goes directly back to community.


