

Now when all the people were baptized, and when Jesus also had been baptized and was praying, the heaven was opened, and the Holy Spirit descended upon him in bodily form like a dove. And a voice came from heaven, "You are my Son, the Beloved; with you I am well pleased." - Luke 3:21-22

On Sunday, January 12th we will be celebrating the Baptism of Our Lord Sunday. During worship, we will invite anyone forward, who has not been baptized before, to be baptized - baby, adolescent, teenager, or adult.

Baptism is central to our faith and identity as Lutherans. We believe that Baptism is the first step in our Covenant relationship with God. A Covenant relationship is a relationship built on trust, where both parties hold up an end of the bargain. God's end of the Covenant is that the time when we are Baptized we are initially received into the Christian community, we receive the Holy Spirit, and we enter into God's salvation.

We also have our end of the Covenant, which are the promises that we make to God and to our community of faith at Baptism. You can read through these promises on page 228 of the ELW (aka the cranberry hymnal in the pews).

We also believe that there is only one baptism. While we may mess up our end of the Covenant relationship - God remains faithful throughout. There is no need to be baptized multiple times, because we trust and believe that God follows through on the promises that God makes to us in baptism.

If you (or someone in your family) have not been baptized and want to learn more about Baptism, contact me (Pastor Calvin) and we can talk more.

On Sunday, January 12th, Baptism will be offered to all who have not been baptized who would like to be baptized. Even if we haven't talked before, even if it's at the last minute. And for the rest of the congregation, we'll give thanks for our baptism together at the beginning of the service, and be reminded of the Covenant relationship that we live in with God and with each other.

In the time of King Herod, after Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea, wise men from the East came to Jerusalem, asking, "Where is the child who has been born king of the Jews? For we observed his star at its rising, and have come to pay him homage." When King Herod heard this, he was frightened, and all Jerusalem with him... Matthew 2:1-3

When the "wise men from the East" finally make their way to Jerusalem, following the star for who knows how long, they look for someone who might know the big news. And who might know the big news about someone being born the new "King of the Jews"? Probably the current royalty.

Here is the part of the text that really stands out to me: When King Herod heard this, he was frightened, and all Jerusalem with him. King Herod is frightened because he might lose his power. But why is all of Jerusalem frightened with him?

I think they're frightened because the idea of change is terrifying. It didn't matter if Herod was a good king or a terrible king - as the old saying goes, "Better the devil you know than the devil you don't." The idea of new rulership is scary because it's unknown.

But Christ was born to lead us all into the unknown.

Before Jesus, there was the Law. A list of demands of what we need to do and not do, and if we messed up even once, the penalty was death. But Jesus came and brought grace, an unknown and frightening thing that accepts as where we are, and as we are. Grace that loves us through thick and thin, saves us against all odds, and leads us into a relationship with God

and our neighbors. So, as the angels said to the shepherds, "Do not be afraid." The grace found in Jesus is good news of great joy for all the people.

Dear Siblings in Christ,

This is Pastor Calvin writing to you on behalf of Bethlehem's Reconciling in Christ (RIC) Committee. The RIC Committee is an official committee of Bethlehem that is exploring what it means to be a welcoming church, and whether or not it is a good fit for Bethlehem to be an official RIC congregation.

What does it mean to be an RIC Congregation?

Straight from the Reconciling Works website: The purpose of the Reconciling in Christ (RIC) Program is to ensure the welcome, inclusion, celebration, advocacy for people of all sexual orientations, gender identities, and gender expressions; work for racial equity and commit to anti-racist work and support the national program.

This is our opportunity, as a church, to explore what it means to not only be a welcoming church, but to publicly and boldly say that we are welcoming to all of God's children.

What are the Steps for the RIC Committee?

The RIC Committee are the leaders in the exploration process at BLC. There is a curriculum that we use to help our congregation explore what it means to be welcoming, inclusive, celebratory, and advocates for LGBT+ folks and people of color.

The Committee will be reaching out to members of the congregation for informal one-to-one conversations in order to: 1) share our statement of intent (printed on next page); 2) get to know you better; and 3) hear your thoughts and feedback on our welcome statement.

The Committee will also provide educational and explorative opportunities for the congregation to think and talk about what it means to be welcoming, and to learn more about our neighbors who are different from us.



As a church, we have a commitment to listen to each other. Jesus modeled this behavior during his life on earth. He asked people questions and listened to their answers ("Do you want to be well?"; "Who do you say that J am?"); he gave people on the margins time, love and attention; and he led with compassion and love. We, too, are called to listen to each other without judgment, to learn from each other, and to lead with compassion and love.

These conversations are deeply personal to many people, and often can be emotionally charged. My hope for Bethlehem is that we can listen to each other, love each other and care for each other, and continue to grow in our faith together. I will continue to keep this process in my prayers, and invite you to join me in praying for our community. Please contact me if you want to know more about this process - my office door is always open to you.



Statement of Intent

The Reconciling in Christ Committee at Bethlehem Lutheran Church intends to:

- 1. Explore and develop, along with the larger church body, a welcome statement, that specifically includes and lists people who have experienced oppression from the Christian church. People who have experienced oppression due to racial and social inequities, gender and gender orientation, and other types of oppression, need to know where they are safe.
- 2. Invite all people, which includes all races, ethnicities, genders and orientations, to full participate in leadership positions, ministry, fellowship, worship, sacraments, responsibilities, blessings and joys of our church community.
- **3. Encourage** usage of spaces within the church building that support the needs of all people, and encourage discussion of physical changes to the church building to create a more welcoming space to all people.
- 4. Encourage annual meaningful contributions to local organizations and other synodical organizations, which support all people.

Global Refuge assists with finding places to live, connecting with services and resources, learning a new language, enrolling in school, finding employment, and building a strong economic foundation as they integrate into new communities. Here are some numbers reflecting the impact of Global Refuge in 2023 figures:

1,821 children served through foster care

8,507 asylum seekers received respite services

378 Ukranian refugees resettled

14,500 Afghans resettled in communities across the country

Our Annual Meeting is set for February 2, 2025. Reports will be available later this month.



MLK on What Really Matters

Exactly two months before his assassination, Martin Luther King Jr. preached his final sermon at Ebenezer Baptist Church in Atlanta. On February 4, 1968, the civil-rights icon spoke about how he wanted to remembered at his funeral. He preferred that people recall not his education or achievements but that he "tried to give his life serving others" and "tried to love somebody."

Adapting a 1952 homily by J. Wallace Hamilton, King decried the "drum major instinct — a desire to be out front, a desire to lead the parade." Humans often want to be great and first, as evidenced by the disciples James and John requesting prime seats in paradise. But King urged listeners to focus on the "reordered priorities" of Jesus, who wants us to "be first in love."

As Jesus showed, "everybody can serve," King said. Your background or status doesn't matter, as long as you have "a heart full of grace" and "a soul generated by love."

January 20th is the national observance of Martin Luther King, Jr. Day. The church offices will be closed that day.

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
