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Our Church Calendar Year is called the Revised Common Lectionary (RCL) and is split up into 3 different years: Year A, B, and C. We're currently in Year B, and all of the scripture passages that we use will be the same across the nation for all of the churches that follow the RCL.

In Year B, we get 5 weeks in a row of "bread." We read some discourses from John where Jesus feeds the 5,000 and later says, "**I am the bread of life**." It's a beautiful image of Jesus, feeding us physically and spiritually - but it's also a lot of bread right in a row.

There is a reason that Jesus chose bread as a metaphor for how God shows up in the world. Did you know that bread dates back 30,000 years? It's the oldest prepared food. Every culture has their own variation of bread - flatbreads in the Middle East and Africa, risen breads in Europe, pan breads from Asia (even variations of rice bread), fry breads North America, tortillas in South America.

Bread is cheap, easy to mass produce, filling, easy to carry, and widely available.

Jesus, the bread of life, is free, easy to share, spiritually filling, easy to carry with us (The Bible is the bread of life, after all), and readily available for everyone.

So break bread together, and be intentional about thanking God for your physical food and spiritual food. Know that when you gather together over a meal, Christ is with you. And find your own, creative and unique ways to share the spiritual bread of life with your neighbors. As we say in our communion liturgy, "At Christ's table, there is more than enough."

I've been thinking a lot about listening lately.

I was told something many years ago that transformed the way I listen - at least in times when I'm being intentional. I was told, "*Most people listen to respond. Instead, listen to understand.*" Someone probably said this while I was breathing in with my mouth hanging open, waiting to say whatever I was going to say after they finished talking.

When we listen to understand, it completely changes the conversation.

In scripture, God's people are prone to not listening, not seeing, and focusing on themselves instead. In Matthew 13:15, Jesus quotes the book of Isaiah, saying

> For this people's heart has grown dull, and their ears are hard of hearing, and they have shut their eyes, so that they might not look with their eyes, and hear with their ears and understand with their heart and turn and I would heal them.'

Notice the end, when we listen, when we really listen to understand, God heals us. There is a lot of division in our nation that has been caused, in part, by not listening to each other. But if we can listen to our neighbors to understand them, their perspectives, their needs, their hopes and fears - that's when God is able to heal.



Hospitality Teams at Bethlehem

The BLCW met in mid-June to talk about the future of our hospitality ministry at Bethlehem. Throughout the decades, the BLCW and many volunteers have made luncheons at funerals happen (among many other meals and times of coffee and treats). This is an important ministry of coming alongside families who are in grief, and giving them time to eat and share memories with their family and friends. We know that there are many in this congregation who have Spirit given gifts of hospitality - people of all sexes and gender expressions - and who want to be a part of this ministry.

August25: Bethlehem's Contemporary Service with our Average Worship Band

On August 4th Paul Jacobson will join us playing his flute and introducing us to a new composition, "New Song," which we will sing together as the gathering song. The hymn "New Song" (by Paul Jacobson) was written for the **2024 Summit of the EcoFaith Network** presented at First Lutheran in Duluth by three synods, NE Minnesota, St. Paul, and NW Wisconsin. The summit was entitled "*Cross-Currents in the Flood: Building Arcs Together for a Livable Future.*"

This hymn could be described as occupying a new type of hymn - environmentally "edgy" hymns, but it uses many time-honored styles, including African call and response hymns. Based on a few verses from Psalm 96, which begins "*Sing to the LORD a new song*," the hymn begins with a call and response refrain that opens instead with the question "Can we sing a new song," asking the congregation to explore that hard question in a distressed environmental time.

One of the amazing features of Psalm 96 is that it exhibits not humanity praising God's creation but rather all of creation singing those praises - the heavens, the earth, the sea, its creatures, etc. The hymn explores this story of nature praising God's creation, and it moves from questioning how earth can sing God's praises when God's creation is threatened by human action to a positive view, inviting humanity to enter the praise -"Now let all the earth sing praises to the Holy One." The hymn is a journey. The call and response of the refrain invites the congregation into this journey. Oh, and did I mention that, in the refrain, the term "new song" begins with the Latin "Canticum Novum" and cycles through eight languages (Latin, Hebrew, Arabic, Anishinaabe, Lakota, Spanish, Swahili, and finally English. Thank goodness it's "call and response"!

A little background:

Paul Jacobson, flutist and composer, is a founder of Minnesota's Lyra Baroque Orchestra and has had an active career playing 18th century flutes with many ensembles in Minnesota and throughout North America. He studied composition at St. Olaf and in New York City at Union Theological Seminary School of Music and at Columbia University. Paul also enjoys playing modern flute and Native American flutes, especially in the context of worship. His compositions include many hymns, cantatas, and various liturgical music.

Paul and his wife Diane work with Lutheran environmental organizations, including those in the NE Minnesota Synod and St. Paul Area Synod. And they enjoy hiking with their dog Zipporah ("Zippy"), gardening, and fishing.

Diane and Paul have had a long and wonderful relationship with Bethlehem Lutheran Church. Although we are members of Lutheran Church of the Redeemer in St. Paul, Pastor Mark Ditmanson dubbed them "demimembers" of Bethlehem. Moreover, Pastor Mark was among Diane's first group of advisees when she began teaching at Luther Seminary, and his father Harold Ditmanson was a teacher and mentor to Paul at St. Olaf College. We are so thrilled to continue our deep relationship with Bethlehem and all of our friends here with Pastor Calvin leading the congregation.



Jazz Service: Our History

This year is the 12th Annual Jazz Service (August 18th), a liturgical idea first suggested by Pastor Mark Ditmanson to Mike DeBevec. Mike was a jazz musician and long-time member of our congregation who occasionally played his original jazz compositions at Sunday services. Pastor Mark had found some published music listed as a jazz service and showed it to Mike. Mike examined it carefully and replied: "This

doesn't look like jazz to me. I'll write one for you."

Mike's idea was a choral work local accompanied by jazz instrumentalists, with communitywide ecumenical participation. He also envisioned a work that would evolve and vary from year to year, with a core Jazz Liturgy of eight songs, based on the order of the Lutheran service. that would gradually become familiar to the congregation. Four hymns, either composed or arranged by Mike, would supplement this music, with refrains that would invite the congregation to also sing. Mike initially recruited a choir of 30-35 Cook County singers each year. The Jazz Service was recorded live at BLC in 2015 on CD, and distributed to the congregation, choir, & community at large. Subsequently, it became necessary to perform the service with a smaller choral ensemble of 8-9 talented people, an easier task with changing music and limited rehearsal time.

Our own Church Music Director Karina Roth has been indispensable in the development of the Jazz Service as a choral director, soloist, advisor, and leader of the congregation. Two other community churches have requested the Jazz Service for the past four years, so now "we're on the road"!

A little background:

Mike DeBevec was introduced to jazz by listening to his older brother's Dave Brubeck records at age 13. Although he had standard piano lessons culminating in recitals in classical music by that time, he quit formal instruction and was subsequently self-taught in rock and popular music, beginning public performance at age 16. He has regularly performed in most public venues in Cook County since 1975.

He began private study of jazz mentored by Ryan Frane, the director of Jazz Studies at UMD, in 2004 and enrolled in formal courses at UMD from 2006-2008, and began jazz composition. He formed Sky Blue Jazz Ensemble in 2009, still together today. The idea of a Jazz Service at BLC enticed him into choral composition in 2011. He has 60 songs registered with the Association of Songwriters, Composers. and **Publishers** (ASCAP), most of them recorded.



Bethlehem Lutheran Church enjoys contemporary worship with praise songs on the fourth Sunday every month and during the schoolyear on Wednesday night services.

Led by Stacey Johnson on piano, Mark Abrahamson, vocals & musicians: Eric Anderson, Myron Bursheim, Nathan Kristenson and Kristin Lindholm on guitars; and singers Chris & Kristin Lindholm, Cindy Muus, Kelly Swearingen, and occasionally Cathi Williams. They have an open invitation to any musicians to join their group any time.



How and where do you listen to Christian music?

I love to listen to Christian music on the radio in my car or on Pandora while I am at home. When I catch myself humming along to a new song that touches my heart, it makes me want to share it. That is mainly how I learn new songs that I share with the Average Worship Band.

Naomi Tracy-Hegg, utilizing Bethlehem's Camper Scholarship, is participating in her 2nd year at Lutheran Summer Music Academy at Valparaiso University in Indiana. Lutheran Summer Music Camp is a faith-based residential music academy for high school students who come together from all over the country to immerse themselves in joyful music-making and build a supportive and welcoming community, living together on a Lutheran college campus.

"Dear Bethlehem Congregation,

I have been having the most incredible whirlwind of a time here at Lutheran Summer Music. Ľm continuing to take organ lessons from Chad Fothergill (a former star student of Pastor Bill's)— he is an incredible teacher and, in my opinion, one of the top people of all time. We're working on Bach's little prelude and fugue in Cmajor, which I'll be performing for the of Lutheran Association Church Musicians on Thursday (wish me luck!), and I just performed Jean Langlais's "Priere" (Prayer) on Sunday. Priere is the first French piece that I've ever learned, which was great fun because French articulation is completely different from the baroque style— I had to learn how to play legato, which involves playing scales with just your thumb (try it— you feel like a snail).

I also got to have a masterclass with Dr. Catherine Rodland, the organ professor at St. Olaf— I actually had a lesson with her a while back when I visited there, and we worked on the same piece here at LSM! She said I did an excellent job incorporating everything we talked about in our first lesson (brag).

Coincidentally, my piano teacher this month is also a St. Olaf professor, Dr. April Kim. She is an outstanding pianist and lots of fun to work with. We've been working on a piece called "Island Lullaby—" it's a Korean lullaby arranged as a piano solo, and it uses chromatic scales to represent waves. It's a lot of fun to play.

I'm also in two electives this year, conducting and composition. Our conducting class got a session with Dr. Jennaya Robison, the director of the National Lutheran Choir. She gave me some excellent pointers on communicating musical decisions through gesture.

Composition class has been so much fun, too—



my teacher is a professor at Luther, so maybe Martine will get to work with her! We watched videos of some insane pieces (look up anything by Henry Cowell to get an idea). We just had our Fresh Ink! recital where all of the composition students' pieces were performed, including mine: "Big Water," inspired by Lake Superior. It's written for piano, cello, and percussion— you can find it on LSM's YouTube channel: https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=nRt80iRhDRc (my piece starts ~38 minutes in). I got my roommate to play the piano part (she is SO talented- I knew she could interpret it better than I wrote it), but I ended up on stage anyways playing the suspended cymbal, because the percussion part is impossible to play with only two hands. I seem to recall Bill playing percussion on one of his own pieces for Borealis- I guess getting roped into playing your own piece and then missing all your cues is something we have in

common!



During this final week, LSM is concurrent with the Association of Lutheran Church Musicians (ALCM) $oldsymbol{O}$ annual conference— and they're holding it right here on campus with us, which is super cool (but also means the food lines are infinite). I've been cornering unsuspecting church musicians and bombarding them with my holistic three -question interview: 1) What's your favorite hymn, 2) How

many times have you fallen off an organ bench, and 3) How do you handle nerves? I feel a little bad for my poor interviewees that just wanted to eat dinner in peace, but that's what you get with Naomi.

I'm in choir with the incomparable Dr. Gravelle againwe're doing a wide range of pieces, including one with body percussion that I'm currently working on memorizing (wish me a little more luck!). I think I mentioned in my letter last year that I loved choir so much that I partnered with Dr. Gravelle to do a survey on why choir brings people joy. I'll be presenting the results of that survey to the ALCM tomorrow (if you have any drops of luck left, please wish them to me!).

I could go on and on--I know I already have, but I didn't even get to ranting about the chapel and the organ and my crazy organ friends). However, I just got back from a four-hour recital (people were doing the Macarena to Vivaldi in the balcony), so I should probably go to sleep. But I want to thank you for sending me to this place- there's nowhere else quite like it. I'm surrounded by incredible people making incredible music, who are applying their skills to create incredible worship. I like to think I'm lucky to be here, but it's not luck- it's the support of all you wonderful people who care about me and my musical journey.

For years visiting and itinerant Lutheran pastors traveled the long and arduous journey to Grand Marais to preach the Word of God to Scandinavian pioneers. Then on September 18, 1889, a group of faithful servants of Christ met at the home of Mathias Johnson and formed First Norwegian Evangelical Lutheran Church of Grand Marais. Less than 3 months later, on the first Sunday in Advent, the fledgling congregation that would someday be named Bethlehem Lutheran held its first worship service. That was December 3, 1889.

"I will remember the deeds of the Lord; yes, I will remember your miracles of long ago. I will meditate on all your works and consider all your mighty deeds." - Psalm 77: 11-12

It is a time to celebrate those first fruits. It is time to remember God's presence in the creation and growth of Bethlehem and our mission. It is time to recall the highlights of Bethlehem's ministry as we have belonged to Christ and have shared Christ on the North Shore and beyond for these 125 years.


