On Sunday, May 26th we celebrated Holy Trinity Sunday. In my sermon I talked about leaning into the mystery - because when we try to experience God in new ways (through cultures, languages, experiences, new traditions, etc.) we find new life, new meaning, and we learn new things about God. We read out of the First Nations Version of the New Testament as a way to practice "leaning into the mystery."

Summers at Bethlehem are a great time to explore the mysteries of God in new ways. During the summers we try new Creeds and New Versions of the Lord's Prayer. We'll also be using Setting 12 of our new *All Creation Sings* hymnal for a good chunk of the summer. New and different can be difficult - and new and different can lead us into new experiences with God.

I want to encourage you to lean into the mystery on your own this summer. Try Lectio Divina when reading scripture, or find a quiet time to meditate using the Centering Prayer, or go on a hike to a new place and soak in the beauty of God's creation. Try something new and see what God teaches you through it. - *Pastor Calvin Konop*

Lectio Divina

Choose a text of scripture. Read the text slowly, as a gift to be received – let the text come to you. Read it multiple times using the following structure:

Listen. Find something (a word or phrase) that sticks out to you. Sit in silence repeating it for a while.

Ponder. Read the text again, and ask how the word or phrase that stood out might speak to your life.

Pray. As you read through for the last time ask what Jesus is calling from you. What is your response to the word or phrase that stood out to you?

Centering Prayer


Centering prayer is a Christian contemplative prayer practice that involves resting in silence with God and letting go of thoughts and emotions. It's intended to deepen one's relationship with God and move from active prayer to a receptive prayer of resting in God.


Find a word (e.g. Jesus, Peace, Love) that resonates with you. Turn on some soft instrumental music and sit in silence, being aware of God's presence, and letting distractions go as they come. Use your word, aloud or silently, to draw you back to God's presence.





Do not remember the former things

When I first got my license I wanted to drive everywhere. I loved the independence, the sense of responsibility, and the freedom. Routines are familiar and important, but they lose their potency when we become so familiar with them that we forget their importance. Like the words in the liturgy on Sunday, or the familiar dinner prayer. This is why God does new things — to shake things up, to wake us up, and to lead us to new places.

May God do a new thing in your life today.

At our May meeting we had a guest speaker from **Together Here Ministries** — Pastor Matthew Cobb. Our Council President, Kris Hedstrom, reached out to the Synod office to ask for help thinking through our relationships with Grand Portage and the Anishinaabe neighbors we have there and here.

Pastor Cobb talked about land acknowledgement statements, moral imagination, and talked about what it means to honor our treaties. He invited us into thinking about our history as a church, and how it might shape who we are today. He also encouraged us to continue to learn about the history of Grand Marais and the Anishinaabe.

The Council formed a sub-committee, of sorts, to look into a potential book study we can do to learn more about the history as a launching point to thinking about our future as a church, and to our relationships with Grand Portage and beyond. Dear Bethlehem Family,

Thank you for choosing to support **North Point** with your mission of the month in June!

Your generosity will make a difference in the lives of teens in our community! We love teens and believe they are a vital part of our community. But



hopelessness is becoming a defining story for this generation breaking down both them and our community. Therefore, we're on a mission to bring hope to teens in Grand Marais.

Our vision for how to accomplish this isn't new or revolutionary. We believe hope shows up when people who care show up. I love what David Brooks says in *The Second Mountain*,

"Relationship is the driver of change. Think about who made you who you are. It was probably a parent, a teacher, or a mentor. It wasn't some organization that was seeking a specific and measurable outcome that can be reduced to metrics. It wasn't a person looking to create a system of change that can scale. It was just a person doing something intrinsically good-making you feel known, cared for, trusted, unconditionally loved-without presuming to know how that relationship would alter the trajectory of your life."

Through the spaces we create, the relationships we form, and the grace-based programs we provide, teens experience support and belonging. They find the safety to be themselves and talk about what's really going on in their lives. They form and strengthen healthy relationships with peers and caring adults. Through the relationships they form and the support they experience they are able to build resiliency, recognize that even in difficult

times God is present in big and small ways. They begin to look to the future with hope and sometimes teens even come to know a loving God because true hope is not simply a generic hope like a fantasy or a wish, but what the apostle Peter called a living hope.

It's amazing just how much of life boils down to hope and I would add gratitude. Gratitude is hope realized, and hope is that for which we wait and long for. Each of them connected to the other, and so essential to human flourishing! We are a hopeful people and because ultimately our hope is not in a situation or circumstance. Those will all end, change or wear out. Rather our hope is in a person named Jesus. He is where we place our hope, a hope that does not disappoint us.

MEMBER CHALLENGE

In talking to Denise, she asked if I might have an idea for a spiritual challenge for us this month. Rather than a challenge, I thought I'd simply ask a question:

What are you really hoping for?

Not just a circumstance like a new job or in my case a historic come back by the Timberwolves from 3-o. In the deepest longings of your heart in light of the living hope we share in, what do you long for? As for me I'm betting the farm on God. As one guy said it, "If God doesn't come to fix his world nobody else is going to do it for him." I hope for a world where no father will abuse his child, or mother will watch their child go to bed hungry, where no family is torn apart by mistrust or brutality or infidelity, where kids will not be taught or encouraged to use drugs, and kids would not learn hopelessness from their cribs. I hope for a world where kids are loved and nurtured and taught and protected and guided towards wholeness.

"May the God of hope fill you with all joy and peace as you trust him, so that you may overflow with hope by the power of the Holy Spirit."

Hello Congregation.

I just want to say thank you so much for your continued prayers

for me. I just wanted to give you a quick update since I have not done one in a while.

I opted to stop doing chemotherapy treatments back in March because the weekly trips to Mayo Clinic in Rochester, being away from my family for several days each time and the unpleasant side effects of the medications were taking their toll on me physically, mentally, and financially.

Since then, I have been trying to take a more natural approach to self-healing. The good news was that most of the tumors in my chest had shrunk significantly from December to March. I have follow-up appointments in June and July to monitor an area of concern in my abdomen and a few in my chest. Overall, I feel pretty good.

I know for a fact that your prayers have helped. I even got one doctor to admit that the amount of decrease in the tumors was not typical for that type of chemo and was very surprising to him. I thank God for that!


